Words to the Wise

Love in Any Language

I recently heard about a TV producer who went to Moscow to develop American-style reality television shows for Russian audiences. The experiment was a dismal failure. Ultimately, the producer learned that the differences between Americans and Russians go so much deeper than a simple change in alphabet.

It made me wonder how we in the church sometimes consider the mission field. How often must we remind ourselves we send out the Gospel—not our culture? While the truth of the Gospel is the same everywhere, how we *articulate* the Gospel has to be tailored to the listening audience. When Jesus told parables, many in the crowd were fishermen and farmers—so He told parables about fishing and farming.

This continues to be true of Christian storytelling today: There are all kinds of Christian fiction, in all genres, written for all kinds of readers. For some of us, a contemporary novel is an opportunity to consider questions of faith, with just enough arm's length so we can be objective. For others, a historical romance or a science fiction drama serves as a reminder that Jesus is Lord of ALL—there is no time or place or territory not under His Lordship. A thriller, a children's book, an Amish romance—whatever Christian fiction title you pick up, it expresses some biblical truth in the vernacular the intended audience can understand.

Some books are for you. Some are not. All are written for the glory of God and to further His Kingdom. Thank God for variety!



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



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
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CHECKMATE

Thriller writer Steven James has made a name for himself with the pulse-pounding adventures of FBI Agent Patrick Bowers—and proves to have a few surprises in store for readers. By C.J. Darlington



Pass the bespectacled Steven James on the street, and you might think he's a cool college professor, or a musician on his way to practice with the band. You probably wouldn't guess this man spends his days plotting murders and how to evade FBI agents. But that's exactly what Steven James does—in his novels, of course.

James has always been a storyteller. As a kid he was a school crossing guard and would pass the time telling himself stories. "I was always making stuff up," James says, "but I never thought I could be a writer."

Everything changed when he felt God's calling and disregarded the naysayers who said it could never happen. Soon his articles started selling. For many years he wrote mostly nonfiction, though even then he used storytelling techniques.

"At the heart of humanity is this God-woven desire to tell and listen to stories," he says. "Through stories we can approach the

overwhelming truths of life. Grief is overwhelming for us, but if we watch a movie or we read a novel where someone is working through grief, maybe then we cry.

"In Haiti 250,000 people were buried alive. We hear that, but it's overwhelming. We don't cry. But if your dog is hit by a car in front of your house, you will grieve. How could that be? We know human life is more valuable than an animal. We know that a quarter of a million people being buried alive is much more tragic, but emotionally we don't connect with that because it's overwhelming. But if you hear about one woman digging through the rubble for her lost baby, maybe then you would cry and it would hit home. Stories allow us mental or emotional space to experience these things."

Which is probably why for many years James longed to pen novels. "I really wanted to write fiction," he says. "So I started work on a detective novel. People always say there

should be something unique about your character, so my lead was going to be a one-handed detective. His left hand was going to be blown off or something. But I realized I needed to work on making him unique in some way other than just a random physical disability. I was doing research on profiling and criminal investigation and stumbled across this whole geospatial investigative approach. So I ended up giving my character Patrick Bowers a very unique niche in the literary world. And he ended up getting to keep both hands.”

Revell Books offered James a three-book contract for the series—which has since expanded into eight. The first novel, *The Pawn*, hit shelves in 2007 followed by *The Knight*, *The Rook*, and *The Bishop*. In each book, FBI Special Agent Patrick Bowers has to not only keep himself and those he loves alive, but he also must wrestle with deep, moral questions. But it’s his geospatial investigative techniques that really do set him apart from his literary contemporaries.


“Everyone forms a mental or cognitive map of the region they’re familiar with, the area where they live,” James explains. “If you lived in Pittsburgh, Pa., and I said, ‘Draw a map of Pittsburgh,’ you could do that. But it would be skewed toward the places you’re most familiar with, and you would leave

large parts of the city unmapped because you just never go there. Killers do the exact same thing. Their routes through a city would have certain patterns defined by the places where they work, go to church, where they visit friends, or shop. Let’s say there were a series of murders. By understanding the locations of where the bodies were found, where the victims lived, or maybe where they were abducted or killed, and then understanding the victims’ travel patterns through that area, you can look backward to try and figure out the most likely location where the killer would have left from, his home base.

“This technique is all based on logic. Eighty-percent of murders happen within a mile of the offender’s home. Somebody commits a crime, they have to get away. Most likely they’d commit a crime in a place they’re familiar with to be able to escape without being detected.”

It’s these crimes James describes in his novels, often in graphic detail, that have a few readers squirming and wondering how the Patrick Bowers series can be classified as “Christian” fiction. “I don’t believe there is such a thing as ‘Christian fiction’—just like I don’t believe there’s ‘atheist fiction’ or ‘Buddhist fiction’ or ‘materialist fiction’,” James says. “I think there’s fiction of excellence and fiction of mediocrity. There is fiction that glorifies God and fiction that doesn’t. Fiction that celebrates the things He celebrates, and fiction that celebrates things He abhors.

“In my books I never glamorize evil and make it look alluring. But I do make you look at it and say, *This is how far people have fallen. This is what our world is like. But guess what? There’s a Redeemer who’s bigger than the evil we’re capable of.* I think you show the worth of something by showing how much pain is caused when it’s lost. I don’t think I could be honest about evil without really making people disturbed by looking at





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it. Someone will ask, *Why doesn't anyone get converted in your novels?* Well, nobody got converted in the stories Jesus told either. Someone else will mention that I don't talk about God very much in my novels. Did you know the book of Esther doesn't mention God? Ever. Not once. Is it Christian? Were Jesus' stories Christian?"

No matter how you classify his books, James has clearly mastered the art of developing a leading man over the span of a series. Patrick certainly grows and changes, but not so much that he becomes someone else. "In each book Patrick becomes more fully human," James says. "He begins to realize different aspects of human nature and grow in that respect. I look at the whole series as his character arc, but in each book I try to keep him consistent as far as his thought process."

With fans already salivating for *The Queen*, which releases in August, you'd think it would be safe to assume the next entry in the series would be *The King*. But James has another plan up his sleeve—a prequel by the title of *Opening Moves*. "I'm actually planning to do *Opening Moves* next instead of waiting until the end. The story is about Patrick and happens 10 or 12 years before *The Pawn*, before he's joined the FBI. He's still a detective in Milwaukee, and this will cover one of his dramatic cases back in his early days. It'll be a lot of fun, where I can

show the genesis of his character and the traits he has. I can bring up some questions and foreshadow some of the things I can then deal with in *The King* and *Checkmate*."


Now that the series is officially a grand success and has won numerous awards (including a Book of the Year nod by *Suspense Magazine* for *The Bishop*)—not to mention, a possible TV series for CBS—you might wonder how many houses Steven James owns, or how many cars he drives. When we bring up the subject of financial return for a novelist, he's quick to discount the myth that being a best-selling author equates to being enormously wealthy.

James explains that if you bought a \$20 hardcover copy of one of his novels, he receives about \$1.20 of that. "You've got to sell an awful lot of books before you're going to put your kid through college," James says. "If you want to be rich, you *might* make it as a writer. But all of the full-time writers I know make about what a teacher makes, much less than someone would ever imagine. We work hard, and we write a lot."

Which is exactly what James is doing now. He's currently writing the sixth book in the series and gathering ideas for the seventh. "And I'm still intrigued with Patrick Bowers," he says. "I'm not sick of him at all. I'm planning to do eight books, and then that's all. But who knows? If he doesn't want to go away, then maybe we'll keep going." **FF**


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
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SOME COZY READING

Meet some of the authors who write under the banner of Hometown Mysteries—where love and suspense meet ... By C.J. Darlington



The moniker “cozy mystery” evokes images of amateur sleuths, small towns, and eccentric characters. It’s a category with a long history of success in the general market, from the golden age of Agatha Christie’s Miss Marple to the modern sleuthing of *Murder She Wrote*’s Jessica Fletcher.

Now, cozies are taking the Christian market by storm—thanks in part to Barbour Publishing’s Hometown Mysteries series, which also include a pinch of romance. “The brand promises a small town setting, with characters who are like any average person, but who suddenly find themselves in the middle of a puzzling mystery,” explains

Rebecca Germany, Senior Fiction Editor at Barbour. “The mystery is cozy, and each plotline also includes a sweet romance thread that is so popular with our reader base. Also at least one character relies on their Christian faith to get through their challenge.”


Each book in the series written by a different author, the line debuted July last year. Barbour has released a book a month since then.

But what exactly defines a cozy? Several HM novelists took the time to answer this question and share the inspiration behind their latest titles in the Hometown Mysteries series:



ELIZABETH GODDARD

"A cozy usually involves an amateur sleuth whom the police don't take seriously," says Elizabeth Goddard (*The Camera Never Lies*). "They're fun to read and include a puzzle to solve—the murder mystery—with plenty of twists and turns. In a cozy, the mystery is the thing! The author must write pure, unadulterated mystery, with clues, red herrings, and an amateur detective who is forced to solve the crime and bring the villain to his just desserts. After visiting Crater Lake National Park, I knew I wanted to set a story there involving a photographer. But it wasn't until I began living life in the story world through my character Polly that I even realized she had a gift of reading people through her camera lens and that it would assist her in sleuthing."




NANCY MEHL

"A good way to describe a cozy is that it is a 'gentle' mystery," Nancy Mehl says. "They're reminiscent of Agatha Christie or G.K.




Chesterton's Father Brown Mysteries. They should also be 'charming', full of fun and offbeat characters. In my novel *Blown Away* it seemed right to start off with a murder. But how to make this murder interesting? How about the murder of a clown? And what if I put him in full costume in someone else's grave? The grave of another deceased clown? Those two thoughts meshed together to give me the idea for the rest of my plot."



CYNTHIA HICKEY

Cynthia Hickey had the general idea for her mystery *Chocolate-Covered Crime* when she started—but didn't yet know who her villain would be. "I thought I did," she says, "but as the story progressed, someone else came forward with a much better motive." All the author knew for sure was that her character Summer would be planning her wedding. It wasn't until Cynthia reached the half-way point in the manuscript that she decided on the final details and made sure her clues lined up. "Summer is by far my favorite character in all three of my books," Cynthia says. "She's gutsy, ditzy, big-hearted, and loves fashion. But most of all, she loves Ethan Banning and solving mysteries. The scrapes she gets herself into are always worth a laugh." And, as far as Cynthia is concerned, that humor is part of what makes a cozy. "They're a rollicking good time as you follow clues to solve a mystery. Leaving the gore and violence behind, the reader can still match wits against the villain."



CHRIS WELL

"A cozy mystery is a whodunit," notes Chris Well, author of *Nursing A Grudge* and *Burying the Hatchet* says. (He is also the editor of this very magazine.) "All the suspects are in some confined space or location, they know each other, and everything is done without gratuitous language, violence or racy content. Some would also say a cozy requires an amateur sleuth, but I'd hate to rule out Hercule Poirot and Ellery Queen on a technicality—of course, Poirot is a retired policeman and Queen is a policeman's son, so maybe they aren't exceptions after all."

Chris was inspired to write *Burying the Hatchet* by a mystery from the 1930s called *The Three Coffins*. "It's considered one of the classic examples of a 'locked room' or 'impossible crime' scenario," he says. "The body is found inside a locked room and the murderer could not possibly have gotten out of the room—yet he or she did. The solution to *The Three Coffins* was so outrageous the reader has to either hate it or embrace it—and I was so enamored with the author's audacity I had no choice but to put both arms around that book, so to speak, and hold tight. As far as I know, my novel could be the very first locked room/impossible crime mystery written for Christian readers.

"In *Burying The Hatchet*, the variation on the 'impossible crime' is that every scrap of evidence makes a minister look guilty—yet, our senior sleuth—and the reader—knows that somehow, inexplicably, the minister couldn't have committed this horrible crime. The mystery challenges Earl to examine his beliefs, as he separates the possible from the impossible."


Nancy Mehl: "*The Player on the Other Side* by Ellery Queen. It's perfectly written and perfectly plotted."

Chris Well: "My favorite mystery series would be the Nero Wolfe books; what Rex Stout did as an author was brilliant."

Elizabeth Goddard: "That's easy: *Your Chariot Awaits* by Lorena McCourtney. She has a way with words that completely fascinates me."

Susan Sleeman: "The Nancy Drew mystery series. If I hadn't picked up a Nancy Drew book, I may never have discovered that reading is fun and then of course, I would never know the joy of creating stories for others to read and that being an author is the coolest job anyone could have."











SUSAN SLEEMAN

“The sleuth is often an amateur detective,” says Susan Sleeman, author of *Nipped in the Bud*. “And they might even be a bit quirky with a great sense of humor—there’s no better place for humor than in a cozy mystery.”

The author is a gardening fanatic, so it was a no-brainer for her protagonist to share that interest. “I wanted to write a book that included gardening tips told in a humorous way,” Susan says. “As the book developed it became clear Paige Turner was single-minded in her gardening efforts. She often thought of people in terms of the plants they resembled, so I let her run wild with it.


“I knew who the murderer was from the start; what I *didn’t* know was how they’d be caught and how that would tie into my main character Paige’s love of gardening and the town’s annual Pickle Fest celebration. I’m quite happy with how the novel ends, and readers tell me they don’t know who the killer is until he or she is revealed.”

The Hometown Mysteries sleuths live in nursing homes, dress hair in funeral parlors, photograph weddings in National parks or even shelve books in libraries. But the eccentric characters aren’t limited to the two-footed variety: One of Elizabeth Goddard’s favorite characters in *The Camera Never Lies* is Murphy, her lead’s Jack Russell terrier. And similar to mainstream author Lilian Jackson Braun’s felines, a parrot takes center stage to help find the murderer of a pet store owner in Frances Devine’s April release *Rest in Peace*. **FF**



BRYAN DAVIS: Dragons and Heroes




His books sell like blockbusters. Readers of all ages tell him how his books have changed their lives and brought them closer to Christ. Yet starting out, Bryan Davis garnered more than 200 rejections over eight years before finding a publisher for his first novel, *Raising Dragons* (AMG).

Now with more than a dozen novels in print and eager readers clamoring for more, Bryan spends his days writing, editing and marketing his books, sometimes visiting more than a hundred different venues a year. "My main focus in promoting is visiting schools and homeschool groups," he says. "I travel across the country and speak for free, hoping to demonstrate that I really believe in and live by the standards I write about. I also have a good Internet presence—blog, Facebook, email newsletter and message forum. I make frequent updates to these outlets and keep my readers informed about news and tour updates."

Most of Bryan's books are contemporary fantasies—stories set in our current world with strong fantasy elements. His two current series, however, take readers to entirely new places: the human planet of Major Four, and the faraway planet where dragons keep humans as slaves, Dracon. Jason Masters, a young swordsman, finds a



portal to Dracon in *Starlighter* (Zondervan), and teams up with a slave girl, Koren, to rescue those kept in bondage. Jason's older brother, Adrian, finds another route to Dracon, but his plans are destroyed by the impetuousness of swordmaiden Marcelle in *Masters & Slayers* (AMG).

The books also stretch Bryan's skills in other ways beyond new worlds. While the Dragons of Starlight series (Zondervan) is written for Bryan's typical teen audience, his companion series Tales of Starlight (AMG) is written for adults.

One wonders whether two series with two different publishers might force him to compete with himself. "It might be too early

to make a judgment, but I haven't seen a problem so far," Bryan says. "I think readers of either series will want to read the other series to get a full picture of the story world. So far, both have sold well. I think they complement each other."

Bryan often hears from parents concerned about fantasy literature. "Parents are right to watch what their children read, because there's a lot of damaging material on the market," the author says. "I'm a conservative homeschooling father of seven children, and I would not put anything into their hands that isn't trustworthy. I'm not going to write any messages outside of traditional Christian values."

Homeschooling his children was actually what turned Bryan toward writing. Unable to find a curriculum for writing that met his family's needs, he began crafting a story to demonstrate the process, and the story grew into a novel. That was 16 years ago.

Today, his family still plays a large role in his writing in their Tennessee home: His wife, Susie, edits his books while his children provide ideas and feedback. Bryan loves that he can set his own schedule and be home with his family while writing full-time.

But his favorite part of being a writer is the ability to make a difference in the lives of his readers. "The heart of all my novels is selfless sacrifice," he says. "I try to create heroes and heroines who rise above the mediocrity that so many find to be acceptable and normal. My stories tell readers that they can be courageous; they can conquer their fears and doubts; they can rise up and be all that God has called them to be." **FF**



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
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


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
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
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
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

Other features on the disc include an audio commentary, the silly song “The Hopperena,” a behind-the-scenes featurette with Melinda Doolittle, and an interactive game.




The film modernizes the story, set in a town that has hit on hard times. A local



Bold Comics Anthology



Comics artist Mike Maihack saw a problem: An absence of quality, faith-driven comic work in independent comics.

He set out to remedy that by putting out a call to artists. “I was fortunate to already have a very small presence on the web because of a webcomic I was working on at the time,” Maihack recounts. “So, thankfully when I started pitching the idea of a Christian comic anthology, people knew I was serious.”

The result is *Parable: Volume 1* (Lamp Post Inc.), a 200-page anthology with contributions from more than 20 comics writers and artists, including talent who’ve worked for Marvel Comics, Disney, Zonderkidz, Image Comics and Big Idea.

What attracted many of the artists was Maihack’s approach to the kind of material he wanted. “I wanted to emphasize the value of Christianity rather than an evangelistic approach that had previously kept a lot of publications from reaching a

wider market. At its root though, it was a reason to use our joy of comics to celebrate our love of Christ as well as fellowship with other creators.”


Maihack hopes the anthology will show the outside market that Christian comics can be fun, entertaining and well-drawn. “Likewise I hope to introduce the Christian market to a variety of different comic styles they might not be used to,” he says. “Mainly though, I hope it’ll bring readers to a richer and fuller understanding of Christianity.”

5 Questions: Eric Wilson

Eric Wilson often uses his fiction to explore earth's tension between heaven and hell. His books include the *New York Times* bestsellers *Fireproof* and *Facing the Giants*, as well as eight suspense novels, including *Dark to Mortal Eyes* and *The Best of Evil*. He broke new literary ground with his Jerusalem's Undead trilogy, which mined some surprising territory in Scripture—and sent more than one reader scrambling for their home Bibles to double-check that, *Yep, that passage was right there all along*. His next novel, *One Step Away*—which promises a new twist on an ancient story—comes out this fall.

Your Jerusalem's Undead trilogy is steeped in serious biblical and early church history. Did the research lead to the story, or did the story lead to the research?

I have a bachelor's degree in theology, and that did play a part in this trilogy. There were still things I had to study, though. For example, I wanted my Collectors—demonic and vampiric beings—to have a theological basis for their desire to pervert mankind's senses.

While exploring this, I realized that in the Bible we never see demons affecting the physical realm unless through a host, human or animal, while angels are shown interacting in the physical realm on numerous occasions. This led to some deep theological concepts about the results of sin and the Fall.

You traveled all the way to the Holy Land to see these sites in person. How important was that in helping you set the stage on paper?

It was huge. In my books, physical location has always been a "character," so to speak, and I really needed that confidence of walking the land myself.

My last day in Jerusalem, I met the lady who originally crawled through the tombs of the Field of Blood, when they were first

unearthed in 1989. She said, "I hope your book is scary, because it was a very scary place."

Your novels range from mysteries to supernatural thrillers to contemporary fiction—do you have to do anything different as a writer to approach a different genre?

My personal tastes range from classical music to hard rock. I love smash-mouth sports, and I love chess. I love reading books, and I love hiking in the mountains. For me, it's quite natural to write in different genres, because it simply taps into different parts of my personality and interests.

Strategically, though, as a writer, I should've picked one genre and stuck with it. People who see I wrote *Fireproof* are often suspicious of my ability to pull off a vampire novel, for example.

In addition to your original fiction, you also wrote the novelizations for *Facing the Giants* and *Fireproof*. Was there any collaboration with the movies' creators in that process?

I've done three novelizations with the Kendricks, based on their original screenplays. They insisted that everything in the movies be in the books, but then they gave me freedom to explore

back-stories and sub-plots. They were great to work with, and they truly understand the ability of storytelling to communicate truth. I had a blast working with them.

Why do you think story is important?


I've never been a woman in Afghanistan, but I felt the pain and struggle they go through while reading

A Thousand Splendid Suns. I've never been to war, but I shared the fears and horrors of that while reading *Matterhorn*. I've never listened in on the strategies of demons, but I got a sense of their cunning while reading *The Screwtape Letters*.

Story has the power to engage our hearts and minds in ways they would otherwise resist. It's a powerful tool, and it's no mistake that Jesus used parables to share truths with the average people of his day. **FF**



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Remembering Leisha Kelly (1963-2011)

Leisha Kelly was the author of 11 books, among them a best-selling inspirational historical fiction series centered around the Wortham and Hammond families, set in Southern Illinois. At times a waitress, cafe manager, tutor and EMT, Leisha was active in her church and served many years on her local library board, bringing good reads and educational opportunities to her community.

Leisha Kelly, 47, was killed in a car accident on January 25 near Fowler, Illinois. Her son, 16-year-old Justice, was also killed in the crash. Kelly, a resident of nearby Clayton, Ill., was the author of 11 books, among them a best-selling inspirational historical fiction series centered around the Wortham and Hammond families, set in Southern Illinois. Her most recent book, *The House on Malcolm Street*, was published by Revell in September 2010.

Kelly leaves behind her husband, K. J., and a daughter, Hosanna. Kelly home-schooled her two children and served as a children's ministry director and a youth minister at her family's church. The couple had also recently become foster parents.

Vicki Crumpton, Executive Editor for Revell, who worked with Kelly since her first book, *Julia's Hope*, was published in 2001 said, "I remember receiving Leisha's first proposal in 2001. I read what her agent sent and called him that day to ask to read more of the

manuscript. When I presented the proposal to our publishing committee, the team read the proposal and a few sample chapters. The first thing people asked was, 'When can we read the rest?' And every time we received a new proposal from Leisha, people always asked, 'When can I read more?' Leisha's fans felt the same way. They always wanted to know when her next book would be out.

"Leisha Kelly was an amazing talent," Crumpton said. "More than that, she was an amazing person, loved by family, friends, and her fans. Her unique writing voice will be greatly missed."


Twila Bennett, Senior Director of Marketing for Revell, remembers a story Kelly told her once. "She had a vivid memory of one of her first writing experiences that has stayed with me after all this time. She was young, it was the year that Mount Saint Helens erupted and she had heard the news stories about how the ashes might fall on other states.

She felt a story burning in her and went out to her front porch and wrote and wrote. And then, the ashes from Mount Saint Helens really did indeed begin falling on her paper like snow.

"I keep seeing that young Leisha now and look in wonderment at this girl," Bennett said, "who overcame so much and gained the world on Tuesday with her son at her side."



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
