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

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HISTORIAL ROMANCE: Carolyn Miller

Working Out Her Faith Through Fiction

Carolyn Miller launches a new Regency era series with a story about second chances.

Historical romance novelist Carolyn Miller made waves with her first Regency series, Regency Brides: A Legacy of Grace. She kicks off a brand-new series with **Winning Miss Winthrop** (Kregel Publications), set in the sumptuous salons of Bath, Regency England's royal breeding ground for gossip.

Fans of the wholesome and richly drawn first series won't want to miss this new set of characters. From her home in New South Wales, Australia, Carolyn compares her two Regency-era series, shares which historical detail she fudged for her new novel, and reveals how she uses her characters to wrestle with her own faith.

Carolyn, you recently wrapped up one Regency romance trilogy (Regency Brides: A Legacy of Grace) and are now starting a brand-new Regency romance trilogy (Regency Brides: The Promise of Hope). What are the similarities/differences between the previous set and the new novels? The first series focused around those connected with Lavinia Ellison (*The Elusive Miss Ellison*), such as her cousin (the title character of *The Captivating Lady Charlotte*) and her rival (*The Dishonorable Miss DeLancey*), with each story showing an aspect of understanding grace.

This new series concentrates more on Lavinia's friend, Catherine Winthrop, around whom the first novel (*Winning Miss Winthrop*) is based, with her sister and sister-in-law the focus of the subsequent stories, all of which explore elements of hope.

While most of the characters are different, in the second series there will be some revisiting of some characters from the first book, which is always fun to see how their lives work out.

Readers can also continue to expect to see interesting locations (like Bath & Derbyshire) and Regency-era language, as well as a strong spiritual thread as various characters learn about faith and its practical outworking in their lives. And there will also be more of the wit and romance readers have enjoyed in previous stories!

What can readers expect from Winning Miss Winthrop?

Winning Miss Winthrop is a story about misunderstandings and second chances, with settings that vary from rural Gloucestershire to Bath and London. It's a little like Jane Austen's Persuasion (my fave book), with its portrayal of class differences and tender, slow-burn romance, while it also shows the effects of the reversal of family fortunes—and an Assembly Rooms Masquerade.

What can you tell us about your protagonists?

Catherine Winthrop is almost at her last prayers, rejected years ago by the man who stole her heart. The elder daughter of a baron whose unscrupulous dealings have sent the family into turmoil, she struggles with social expectations and helping her family through their pain whilst dealing with the torment of lost love.

Jonathan Carlew might be handsome and wealthy, but the mystery surrounding his birth has shadowed him throughout his life. His business dealings mark him as something of a "Cit" [contemptuous term for a member of the merchant class].

But his kindhearted upright nature and wry humor mark him as rather more honorable—something he needs to remember when faced with the gossip and speculation of Bath society.

Which character surprised you writing this novel?

I enjoyed getting to know Jon's friend Lord Carmichael more. The viscount's blend of witty charm and smooth sophistication hides a keenly observant eye and insightful nature, which was great fun to write about. Especially in the exchanges he has with his friends—so much so he needed his own novel (*Miss Serena's Secret*, which releases mid-2018).

What is it about the Regency era that keeps you coming back?

The Regency era (1811-1820, when the Prince Regent ruled England in place of his father, King George III, who was considered mad) is a fascinating period of time. The social order was strictly maintained, sometimes resulting in a polite façade of behavior that hid true feelings.

I like the tension this causes, that people had to "keep face" and guard their hearts and words in a way that seems very opposite to today, when it seems almost anything can be said publicly without shame.

This was also a time just before industrialisation which changed the fabric of English society,—a time of inventions, exploration, and war, all of which play a role in the stories I write.

Plus, it's a time when men were gentlemen, and women were ladies. (At least it is in the stories I write!) So, there is a lovely, almost fairy-tale element about this era.

After all, Jane Austen first introduced the wonderful Mr. Darcy in the Regency era—need I say more?

Does living in Australia give you a different perspective on the Regency period than if you lived somewhere else? I don't know if it has, although being part of the British Commonwealth means Australia shares a number of similarities with England, such as certain aspects of language (spelling and certain phrases), dry humor, and an appreciation for how widespread the British influence was in the world. I do try and incorporate an Australian reference in each of my novels!

What kind of research do you do for these novels?

Different novels require different forms of research. For Winning Miss Winthrop I was fortunate enough to travel to the United Kingdom and visit Bath and walk around the streets mentioned in the novel—even taste the waters at the Pump Room!

Of course, Bath today is very different from 200 years ago, so further research was needed for historical accuracy. This involved poring over research books and reading online publications, such as letters and diary entries written by contemporaries of the time. This led to my changing descriptions of Bath Abbey to reflect what was actually there in 1816 (alas, the gorgeous stained glass windows you can see today had to go).

What were your goals writing Winning Miss Winthrop?

I love books by Jane Austen and Georgette Heyer which were set in the Regency period. I always aim to write something along those lines, but which contains an element of faith, in addition to the witty wordplay and historical detail associated with Regency England.

In Winning Miss Winthrop, I wanted to explore the challenges of some of these social differences, such as romance across class lines. There were not too many cases where an Elizabeth Bennet could marry a Mr. Darcy!

I also wanted to write this using the perspective of a more meek heroine. Someone who wasn't pushy, who was trying to honor God in how she treated others, but still struggled along the way. (Catherine's inner snark means she's definitely no Mary Sue-type character!)

I also wanted to examine the effect of gossip, and how this often-underrated vice had the potential to destroy individuals and families at a time when reputation meant everything.

Fact vs. Fiction: What liberties did you take with historical facts to make *Winning Miss Winthrop* work?

In 1816, England experienced what's known as "the Year Without a Summer," when the 1815 eruption of Mt. Tambora in the Dutch East Indies sent millions of dust particles into the atmosphere. (This was alluded to in my third novel, *The Dishonorable Miss DeLancey.*) This affected the Northern Hemisphere climate for the next few years.

I didn't want to make Catherine and Jon spend the entire time inside due to the cold and rain. I had to adjust things to ensure a few days of sunshine for their horse-riding and other activities.

As a Christian author, how does your faith impact how you plot and write your historical romances?

In Regency England, church attendance was the norm. People were used to a strict moral code and to hearing—and reading—sermons. This cultural context is helpful as it means I can encourage my characters to wrestle with their faith and make it personal.

This can take them from being "Christian" (i.e., a good person) to being "a Christian" (a follower of Jesus Christ). This allows for me to give my characters issues that I've wrestled with, things like dealing with unforgiveness, or learning patience (still working on that one!), or trusting—and even praising—God when all seems lost.

These fictional people become a vehicle for my own outworking of faith, and what God has shown me about His character and my walk with Him. It's not to say every issue you see is a personal reflection of me. I'd be sent to Bedlam (Bethlem's Insane Asylum) if that was the case.


But I try to write honestly about my faith and how it has changed me. I aim to give each main character a spiritual struggle in addition to all the other things they have to endure. (I'm so mean!)

On a practical writing level, I will always pray and commit my stories to God, and ask Him for wisdom. I'm a mum to four children under 16, and my husband works away from home a fair bit of the year. Writing can be a challenge at times, but God continually proves Himself faithful, and the stories get written and those deadlines met. (Thank you, God!)

HISTORICAL ROMANCE: Lisa T. Bergren

Staying (Mostly) True to History

In the latest novel from **Lisa T. Bergren**, an heiress travels to the West Indies and finds she has a lot to learn.

In Lisa T. Bergren's latest historical novel, **Keturah** (Bethany House), a group of sisters leave their home in England for the West Indies to save what's left of their heritage. Set on keeping her family together and saving her father's plantation, can Keturah ever surrender her stubbornness and find the healing and love awaiting her?

In this interview, Lisa shares with us what inspired her to set her new series in this historical period, the essential qualities of a heroine and a leading man, and how God gives us the strength to keep going even in hard times.

Lisa, your brand-new series is the *Sugar Baron's Daughters*. What can readers expect from this new series?

From what I can recollect of the market, a fresh setting—the West Indies/Caribbean—which provides a new locale to wrestle with an age-old problem: declining family fortunes. And then you add in my trademark—strong female heroines doing things they really ought not be doing—and you have an interesting recipe for a novel.

What is it about this time and setting—the 1770s on a sugar plantation in the West Indies—that made you want to set a series there?

I love historical periods of transition. I've written medievals that were pre-Renaissance, pre-Reformation—before what most people think of as "medieval." I wrote the Grand Tour series of Europe set just after the Titanic sank and before

World War I. To me, those times of transition for a region are symbolic of change for everyone who lived there.

And in the West Indies, it's a similar time. The sugar boom has apexed and fortunes across the Caribbean are in decline; the Revolutionary War is brewing to their north; Britain is having a hard time keeping control across the Empire.

And the British-held islands in the West Indies—like Nevis, where my novel is set—are caught between their English foundations/protectors and the North American colonies who feed/supply them.

What can you tell us about Lady Keturah Banning Tomlinson? She's dealing with the loss of her father, and now she's traveled to this strange place to deal with family business and fend off questionable suitors...

She's really in no mood to entertain any suitor, because her first, arranged marriage was to an awful man who looked like a prince on the outside, but was horrible inside. She's returned home to her sisters when word reaches of them of her father's death as well as the very dire circumstances of their English estate ... and the Nevisian plantation, Table Top.

She's weary of being the victim of men's actions, so she takes action of her own, electing to travel to the West Indies to save the plantation. Not that she's perfect. She figures since she's gifted at gardening, she can run a plantation. There's a steep learning curve ahead for her. Happily for her, a childhood friend, Gray Covington, is also embarking on the same journey.

What do you consider the essential qualities of a heroine?

My favorite heroines embody characteristics I want to emulate—courage, compassion, humility (sometimes it takes a while to forge), faith, inner strength, willingness to learn from mistakes, passion for life and love.

What about the essential qualities of a leading man?

That's interesting to answer that on the heels of the last... because they're many of the same characteristics. But I would also add a fierce, protective love of his woman. Because, c'mon—that gets me every time.

What kind of research did it take to capture the world of Caribbean sugar plantations in the 1700s?

I actually started thinking about sugar plantations when I was on vacation in Kauai and read a local book on the history of the plantations there. My family had traveled to Nevis eight years before, so it was a natural jump in my imagination.

So then we had to go back to Nevis for me to get more targeted research done. The things I do for my readers...

A visit to the slavery museum in Liverpool, England, was the darker part of my research. When I began, I was thinking purely crystal-clear waters, sandy beaches, swaying palms ... but as I delved into a stack of research books on the era and the region, I realized it was going to be the most challenging aspect of all. Because slavery was ugly everywhere, but it was ugliest in the West Indies.

Fact vs. Fiction: How important is historical accuracy to you? Did you have to fudge any historical details to fit the story?

I try to stay as true as I can to history, noting in the back of the book when I know that I diverged. For instance, in *Keturah*, there's a mudslide. I didn't find any reference for that on Nevis, but there was at least one horrific slide on the neighboring St. Kitts, so it's not hard to imagine the same happening there. The other place I probably fudge is how Georgian life might have been on-island.

There are good research books for life and customs in England, but it was difficult to discern how much of that transferred to the islands. Were they really wearing all those layers of clothing and powdered wigs in 90-degree heat and humidity? It appears from a few pictures at least some did, some of the time, but I imagine some did not.

Here and there I take fictional license, but I try not to on the big stuff.

What do you love the most about writing historical fiction? Getting swept away into a fabulous setting and interesting time period automatically sets the stage for a good love story. As soon as I start thinking about it, it's like a movie score is playing over my iPod... I mean, characters practically pop onto the page as romantic heroes and heroines.

And nonfiction research often yields wonderful options for my fictional story, basically feeding me ideas for plot and action scenes.

Lisa, you've written in more than one genre. (And for more than one age group!) When it comes time to write another book, how do you decide which kind it's going to be? Years ago, a publisher-friend said to me, "Lisa, if you had just stuck with romances, like you began with 20 years ago, you'd

stuck with romances, like you began with 20 years ago, you'd be a household name." Sticking with one genre helps an author build a brand, and makes her readers know what's coming next.

The problem with me is that I get bored easily and God constantly puts new challenges and ideas in my head. I have to follow where He leads me. Otherwise, the writing just doesn't flow. I just finished book two in this Sugar Baron's Daughters series and have the third to write, but I'm already thinking about the next series, and what's capturing my imagination is another time-slip series (like River of Time) or epic universeslip sort of trilogy...

New and challenging is what sparks my creativity, not same ol', same ol'. And yet now I've been at this long enough that I'm starting to do more in genres I've already written before, but it still feels fresh to me because I've taken a break! So maybe I'll become a household name when I'm 80.

What do you hope readers will take away after reading *Keturah*?

Bad things happen. We suffer. We mourn. We struggle. But we get up and try again, because God gives us the strength to do so ... and if we let Him, He heals us and leads us to new blessings, making us a part of the best continuing love story ever. FF

Just Desserts

Visit the Amish Charm Bakery where romance is on the menu

Amish romance author Molly Jebber is a member of the Romance Writers of America's Honor Roll, and her award-winning books have been featured on Publishers Weekly's Best Ten Recommended Reads, in USA Today's Happy Ever After, and RT Book Reviews.

Her latest Amish romance is **Liza's Second Chance** (Zebra Books), the first book in her new Amish Charm Bakery series. In 1912 Ohio, the Amish Charm Bakery is the heart of a close-knit, faith-nourished community, where people can find a refuge, a place to start again—and love that can make their lives new.

In this exclusive interview, Molly shares the historical research behind the novel, how she approaches writing about the Amish, and what readers can expect from the Amish Charm Bakery series.

Molly, there's a lot of stuff going on here in *Liza's Second Chance*—it's an Amish historical romance set in a bakery. What inspired the story in Liza's Second Chance?

I love desserts, and I'm always checking the dessert menu before I read meal options in a restaurant. The Amish are fantastic bakers, and it was fun to write about the cookies, pies, tarts, aroma, and goodies. The bakery is a perfect place to bring in customers with all types of personalities to make the story interesting.

What can you tell us about Liza?

She's wise beyond her years. She puts others she loves before herself. Life has been hard for her in having to deal with difficult decisions. She's determined to remain a widow, until Jacob enters her life. He's not without problems. She wants to help him, but she's afraid of getting too close.

What do you consider the essential qualities of a heroine? I like to have my heroines show their frustration, opinions, and flaws. I like for my heroine to stand on her own at times and show compassion for another character who is being shunned or who has made bad decisions in his or her life exposing the heroine to criticism by others. My heroines have a strong faith in God, and because of this, they want to show compassion for others as God has shown compassion to them.

My strong heroine must be vulnerable at times to allow her hero to see she can let her guard down. To show him she trusts him in the end with her secrets and insecurities.

What were your goals writing Liza's Second Chance?

To show the human side of a faithful believer in God. Liza faces hard decisions in difficult times in her life. To show the compassion she has for others, and the lengths she'll go to protect those she loves. Women who have taken in children either through adoption or family members, or who work with children will relate to this book. And for all readers, my goal is that you will root for Liza and Jacob and find the book entertaining.

What kind of research did you do for the historical details? The internet has a number of sites giving wonderful historical details. I've had the pleasure of interviewing senior adults who remember historical events as children or stories from their grandparents I've found very helpful.

Did setting the novel at a bakery require any kind of research or practice to get those details correct?

No. I visited Charm, Ohio, where I thought it would be fun to plant a fictional bakery. I love sweets, so that made it easy to write about the goodies offered at the bakery.

Given the simple Amish lifestyle, are there many differences between how the Amish were in 1912—and how they were treated by the culture around them—than how things are today? In 1912, they suffered more prejudice from others due to not enlisting in the service and setting themselves apart from everyone else. They still experience prejudice for these same reasons, but not as much as in 1912.

What can readers expect from the Amish Charm Bakery series?

They will find historical facts for the time period woven into the story, a sweet child and pets, a very troublesome teenager, and a man she finds attractive descending on Liza's life. The bakery has all different types of cranky, rude, kind, and pleasant customers, delightful goodies, and turmoil to keep readers entertained.

How do you approach writing about the Plain people in a way that's accurate to their way of life?

I've researched their lifestyle by visiting their towns multiple times. I've interviewed a number of Amish women, and my husband has talked with Amish men. I've bought books written by the Amish, and visited museums and gone on tours giving an overview of the Amish's history.

What do you hope readers will take away after reading Liza's Second Chance?


I hope they are entertained and consider their time well spent reading *Liza's Second Chance*, and they'll look forward to



HISTORICAL ROMANCE: Jocelyn Green

In **Jocelyn Green's** latest novel, **A Refuge Assured** (Bethany House), America's first years explode off the page—including founding father Alexander Hamilton. A lacemaker flees revolutionary France to America, while a veteran of the American Revolution is drawn into the escalating tension of the Whiskey Rebellion. The two are drawn together to fight for the peace and safety for which they long.

In this interview, Jocelyn Green shares why she chose to write about people traumatized by different revolutions, her favorite part of writing historical romances, and what she hopes readers get out of the novel.

Jocelyn, your novel A Refuge Assured brings together Vivienne Rivard, a refugee from the French Revolution, and Liam Delaney, a disillusioned militiaman who fought in the American Revolution. What is it about these characters that made you want to tell their story?

I find both of their plights fascinating—Vivienne fleeing one revolution, and Liam struggling to find his place in the wake of another. They represent lesser-known perspectives and experiences from two highly celebrated revolutions. The ability to put these two characters together offered a great opportunity to explore not just the tension between a hero and heroine, but between liberty and order, as well.

What kind of research did you conduct to write about this historical period?

I devoured every book and digital resource I could find first, plus documentaries on the French Revolution, Marie Antoinette specifically, and the Whiskey Rebellion. I did not go see *Hamilton* on Broadway, but I did read Ron Chernow's

amazing book about Alexander Hamilton since the Treasury Secretary plays a significant role in my novel.

I also took my family on a spring break/research trip out to Pennsylvania. My favorite research spot in Philadelphia was City Tavern, an 18-century-style restaurant that was a frequent haunt of our founding fathers. I created a fictional tavern in Philadelphia for my characters, so eating at City Tavern and getting a tour into every corner was a special treat.

From Philadelphia, we drove to the site of French Azilum, or Asylum. As always, on-site research is the most fun!

By bringing together these representatives from different revolutions, did you find yourself comparing the French Revolution and American Revolution—or are these just historical backgrounds for your characters? Not only did I find myself comparing the two revolutions (just as contemporaries did), but I also detected echoes from our own political conversations today. These are really timeless ideologies, the struggle between personal freedoms and order, whether the end justifies the means, and how best to go about social and political change.

What is your favorite thing about writing historical romances? Other than the research trips, right? There are many aspects I love about it.

One of them is finding two historical figures to bring to life and explore through the vehicle of story—such as a revolutionera lacemaker and a disillusioned militiaman. Showing these characters' hopes, fears, dreams, loves, and struggles is a really captivating way to shed light on the humanity in our history.

What do you hope readers will take away after reading A Refuge Assured?

The primary theme is that of finding refuge in the Lord, when no physical place of safety seems to exist. But a secondary theme popped up through a character I didn't plan on creating: Armand, the father from whom Vivienne had been estranged her entire life. The two flee France together, and through their relationship, a picture of reconciliation emerges.

At one point Armand says to Vivienne, "One is never too old for a father's love." None of us are ever too old—or "too far gone"—for our heavenly Father's love, either. And that is the greatest reconciliation story of all time. That's the real romance I hope readers carry away in their hearts once they turn the last page. **FF**

A trip to the California gold country left me with a hankering to write a story set in a region that prompted the biggest treasure hunt in the nation's history. As one of four siblings, I've got a heart to write family saga type stories. This particular installment was also inspired by the true life, unsolved murder of candy heiress Helen Brach.

Dana, what were your goals writing this novel?

I wanted to write a novel that would leave readers guessing until the end, an adventure with plenty of twists and turns and a deeply satisfying love story. That, and I can't resist a good cowboy hero!



What do you want readers to take away after reading Treacherous Trails?

I hope they will come away with a reminder that they are loved by God, no matter what the circumstances of their lives. I also aim to have them end with the feeling that they've been taken on a thrilling adventure—all from the comfort of their cozy armchairs!

What are the challenges (or benefits) of writing "romances" as a Christian author?

It's especially challenging to write Christian romance in today's market as many of the top sellers are sexually explicit. It's satisfying to provide an alternative, a realistic love story about two people struggling with big issues, without including explicit material. Every great story has an element of love at the core, and it's an honor to be able to write romance that inspires as well as entertains.



It was a year full of great fun and memories. When the time came to pick a setting, I knew I wanted Grace's story to take place in the watermelon world.

What were your goals writing this novel?

As far as goals for this novel go, I desired to create a main character that readers could identify with, all while giggling at the situations she manages to unwittingly land herself in. I also hoped Grace's story would remind us that God has a plan and purpose for why we're all here in this great big, beautiful world.

April, what do you want readers to take away after reading Loving Grace?

The main takeaway is that true happiness comes from resting in the grace of God. Things of this world may make us happy for a time, but they tarnish when compared to what God has to offer. There are other smaller lessons woven throughout the story, but ultimately, I want readers to remember to love themselves and rest in God's loving grace.



What are the challenges (or benefits) of writing romances as a Christian author?



What are the challenges of writing for that age group?

I want to make sure I keep my characters as authentic and relatable as possible. Also, trying to softly weave in the message I'm trying to share without taking away from the story line can be challenging. But I've found the challenge is worth it and very rewarding in the end. **FF**
